# VW Settlement Trustee Notice and U.S. Notice of Filing of Modified Indian Tribe Trust Agreement

The United States has filed the final, fully executed Environmental Mitigation Trust Agreement for Indian Tribe Trust Beneficiaries (as modified on November 15, 2018) with the United States District Judge for the Northern District of California.

The VW Settlement Trustee will provide a Notice of Beneficiary Designation for the Indian Tribe Trust on January 15, 2019 (for the second funding cycle) and moving forward:

• January 15, 2020 (for the third funding cycle)

• January 15, 2021 (for the fourth funding cycle and any subsequent funding cycles)

The trustee will notify Tribes certified as beneficiaries in the first round by December 31<sup>st</sup> with final allocation totals. All federally recognized Tribes not certified in the first round of funding will have until March 18, 2019 to complete the forms necessary to certify as a beneficiary for the second round of funding. Tribal Climate Adaptation Guidebook now available – The Oregon Climate Change Research Institute, along with Adaptation International, created the Tribal Climate Adaptation Guidebook, which provides a framework for climate change adaptation planning in the context of existing tribal priorities. The *Guidebook* builds on the on-going climate-related work in tribal communities, directly considers the unique issues facing Indigenous communities, and identifies opportunities and guidance for incorporating Traditional Knowledges based on the Climate and Traditional Knowledges Workgroup's <u>Guidelines for Considering Traditional Knowledges (TKs) in Climate Change Initiatives</u>. The *Tribal Climate Adaptation Guidebook* is designed to be useful for tribes at any stage of adaptation planning and with varying degrees of funding and staff capacity. The *Guidebook* is designed so that tribes can work through any applicable section and skip sections that are not applicable.

**Opportunity for U.S. EPA Technical Assistance: Travel Efficiency Emissions Assessment and Planning** 

The U.S. EPA's Office of Transportation and Air Quality (OTAQ) is seeking to partner with state, tribal, regional or local transportation and air quality agencies interested in assessing transportation sector emissions and exploring how they could be reduced through travel efficiency strategies. This opportunity continues the EPA's program of Travel Efficiency Assessment Method (TEAM) technical assistance and case studies provided from 2011-2018. The TEAM approach uses travel activity data for the analysis area, transportation sketch modeling techniques, and EPA's MOVES emission model to estimate emissions with and without travel efficiency strategies chosen by the partner agency, so that their benefits can be estimated. Agencies selected to participate in this project will have the technical support of EPA's team of experts to help the participating agency identify and define strategies of interest, gather information, and conduct the analyses. EPA will create baseline and future year on-road emissions inventories to compare the potential effects of the travel efficiency strategies to a business-as-usual scenario. The EJSG program will award approximately \$1.5 million nationwide for this competitive opportunity. EPA anticipates awarding approximately 50 grants (5 per EPA region) of up to \$30,000 each. This notice announces the availability of funds and solicits applications from eligible entities to compete for financial assistance through the Targeted Airshed Grant Program. This program will assist local, state and/or tribal air pollution control agencies to develop plans and conduct projects to reduce air pollution in nonattainment areas that EPA determines are the top five most polluted areas relative to ozone (O3), annual average fine particulate matter (PM2.5), or 24-hour PM2.5 National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). The overall goal of the

# USDA Forest Service Wildfire Risk Reduction/Wildfire Response - \$2.1 million

Application Due: December 21, 2018

Eligible Entities: State governments, local governments, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)

The U.S. Forest Service supports Moving Toward Shared Stewardship Across Landscapes as part of a conceptual framework for making strategic investments across landscapes to co-manage wildfire risk and achieve positive outcomes at the most appropriate scale. Within this framework, The Northeastern Area Cohesive Fire Strategy Competitive Request for Applications is designed to support and carry out the goals of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy (NCS) across the Midwestern and Northeastern States as well as meet the intent of the current year budget direction. These national goals are:

- 1. Restore and Maintain Landscapes: Landscapes across all jurisdictions are resilient to fire-related disturbances in accordance with management objectives.
- 2. Create Fire Adapted Communities: Human populations and infrastructure can withstand a wildfire without loss of life and property.
- 3. Improve Wildfire Response: All jurisdictions participate in making and implementing safe, effective, efficient risk-based wildfire management decisions.

### **EPA Tribal Clean Diesel Funding Assistance Program FY18 – \$2 million**

Applications Due: April 3, 2019

Eligible Entities: Tribal governments and Alaska Native Villages which have jurisdiction over transportation or air quality

EPA's Office of Transportation and Air Quality is soliciting proposals nationwide for projects that achieve significant reductions in diesel emissions in terms of tons of pollution produced by diesel engines and diesel emissions exposure, particularly from fleets located in areas designated as having poor air quality. Further, priority for funding will be given to projects which result in outcomes that benefit affected communities, those that engage affected communities with respect to the design and performance of the project, and those which can demonstrate the ability to promote and continue efforts to reduce emissions after the project has ended. #### DOI FWS Clean Vessel Act – \$12 million

Applications Due: December 24, 2018 Eligible Entities: States governments

The Clean Vessel Act of 1992 was signed November 4, 1992 (106 Stat. 5039) and codified in 33 U.S.C. 1322. The Act amended the Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act (Wallop-Breaux Act; 16 U.S.C. 777) and established the Clean Vessel Act Grant Program to provide funding to the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Commonwealths, and territories of the United States of America (States). Funding allows States to construct, renovate, operate, and maintain pumpout stations and waste reception facilities for recreational boaters and to inform boaters about the use, benefits, and availability of pumpout stations and waste reception facilities. Subsequent reauthorizations of the Acts have allowed for the continuation of CVA. For more information, visit the funding opportunity description.
